THE NEXT MOVIE WILL BE selected parts of *A Path Appears*, the video based on the best-selling book *A Path Appears: Transforming Lives, Creating Opportunity* which follows Pulitzer Prize-winning journalists Nicholas Kristof and Sheryl WuDunn as they explore the devastating impact of poverty in America, and the ripple effects that follow of gender-based violence and child abuse, sex trafficking and sex slavery.
