Invite your friends to the Blessing of the Animals on October 2

On Sunday, October 2nd, we will celebrate St. Francis (his day actually being October 4th) and offer a Blessing of the Animals at 3 p.m. in our courtyard. This is one of the simplest celebrations we offer and one that brings people of all ages and backgrounds together, whether Christian or not, to take a moment to lift up the gift of our relationship with other creatures and ask God's blessing upon them.

St. Francis of Assisi is one of the most beloved of our saints. He understood the needs of the poor, choosing to live life as one among them, and he saw the creatures of the earth—Creation as a whole—as kin. He saw the value of all creatures, not just for our

use but in the fact they were created by God, and stories of his actions to work out disputes between animals and humans, and in preaching to them, revealed his understanding of being in relationship with them as well as humanity. It is no surprise that, in our own day, some people have come to call St. Francis the Patron Saint of Ecology and the Environment.

While the Church has always recognized God's Creation in our Scripture and hymnody, our record of caring for it and seeing ourselves inter-related within it has not always been good. We painted a hierarchical view of Creation in many ways, first with humanity and then the ordering of

creatures below it, with those that flew associated with the heavens and those that crawled upon the ground being the least upon the earth. We misinterpreted passages about the Creation stories in Genesis to justify overuse of the world around us and have only recently, in the history of Christianity in the West, begun to lift up our call to be good stewards of Creation and to see ourselves not as rulers over it but inter-related members of it.

Perhaps this is why the celebration of St. Francis and the Blessing of the Animals is an important day for so many. It is the one day we come together, side by side with our companion animals (or a stuffed animal to remember the wild creatures, or a photograph to remember those who have died), and offer thanks and ask God's blessing upon them. So invite your friends and spread the word! Be sure to respect the needs of all those who come: all dogs on leash, cats in carriers, and all other creatures on lead or in a carrier suitable for their needs. We will provide water and some basic treats...and yes, litter, clean-up bags and a can for disposal. Journey and I will see you there!

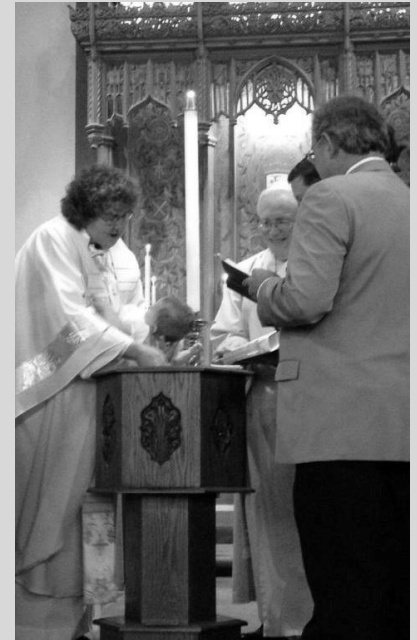
Church School change equals moments of grace

Our Church School kick-off day was a buzz of activity with registration, photos, and a special seed project. It's always fun to start fresh in a new school year. And this year includes some other new beginnings as well. After 20+ years we are changing our Church School format. True to form the changes brought some anxiety, some confusion and some questions. But, as we should also expect, the changes *introduced new moments of grace and space for movement of the Spirit in new and surprising ways.*

Eight adult shepherds were present that morning to welcome and greet our kids. When the registration forms were filled out and most children had arrived, I went downstairs and found groups of

second grade boys playing a table game with a retired English professor. I found 4th and 5th grade girls playing dice with a group of young adults. I witnessed a high school junior shepherding a group of preschoolers in dramatic play. This sort of intergenerational mix is one of the best gifts the Church has to offer. And what's more, during the shared snack time, I overheard half a dozen conversations between children and adults as they shared about school activities, their new instruments, and the like. This is community building at its best!

Sunday morning Book Study looks at 'Life Together'

Sunday mornings at 9:00 in the Guild Room through October 9th. Join our book study of Dietrich Bonhoeffer's *Life Together*, facilitated by Jocelyn Siler. You are welcome to drop in on this class and glean from the discussion.

This story of a unique fellowship in an underground seminary during the Nazi years reads like one of Paul's letters. It gives practical advice on how

life together in Christ can be sustained in families and groups. The role of personal prayer, worship in common, everyday work, and Christian service is treated in simple, almost biblical, words. Life Together is bread for all who are hungry for the real life of Christian fellowship. —Harper & Row, Publishers

Learn more about the personalities of the Old Testament

Wednesday evenings through October 26th, 6:30 – 8:00 p.m. in the parish hall. You are welcome to drop in on Tom Lee's class, *Old Testament Personalities*. Learn about figures like David and Solomon, Isaiah, Jeremiah, and Ruth, Esther and Judith. Learn about who they were, and why they matter to our life of faith. In the process gain further understanding of the history

of Israel, themes in the Hebrew Bible, and methods employed by biblical scholars for the study of scripture.

Class participants should bring a Bible to each session. A New Revised Standard Version, including Old Testament Apocrypha, is recommended.

Other Old Testament personalities to be studied are Moses, Aaron and Miriam, David and Solomon, and Isaiah.

Help us fund a dental clinic in Myanmar

The Social Concerns Ministry has agreed to fund a dental clinic in Phalankone Monastery in Myanmar, where Lani Brewer, Bob Deaton, Pat King, and Carla Mettling taught young Myanmar teachers English, almost a year ago. This clinic will be created and supervised by Studer Trust, whose main activity is building and supporting elementary and secondary schools for the poor in Myanmar. Six students received scholarships, channeled through Studer, from funds HSP raised at the Burmese Banquet in 2014, and 16 volunteer teachers from HSP, under the supervision of Studer, went to Myanmar last year and plan to go again in 2017.

Myanmar is a country where there has been almost no preventive or treatment dental services. The clinic we will fund will serve over 17 nearby villages, in addition to the students, monks, and teachers at the monastery and its school. Studer has already

started a dental clinic in Mandalay, at the monastery where Charles and Kathy Swannack and Nancy Errebo taught last fall. The dentist there will allot 2 days a week to work at and supervise the new clinic at Phalankone.

We want to raise \$5,000 as soon as possible for the dental chair and equipment and have already gotten some of it together from HSP members and Social Concerns Ministry funds. There will be no fundraiser, but donations will be accepted with gratitude. Such donations being given to Holy Spirit for this parish project will be tax-deductible. Checks can be addressed to Holy Spirit Parish with "dental project" on the memo line and sent to the church office.
