

Dear Friends.

How do we measure the progress we're making?

In the relationships that lift us, worship that feeds us, the welcome that reaches into our Missoula community.

We are in the second year of a Vestry-led effort that asks us to increase our giving year over year—the target is 6% per year for five years—to bring us to where we can sustain our budget and build for the future. We made great strides in 2016 thanks to the generosity of so many in the Holy Spirit community, and we look forward to the next steps in our journey together.

I asked our deacon, the Rev. Myrna Chaney, to add her thoughts on our progress, and she returned my request with something of a Montana parable, in her own style:

"Rob Chaney and his friend Dave Kendall were going for a three-day pack trip in Glacier Park, two weeks ago. The goal was to go to Chaney Glacier. Two perfect days were followed by thirteen miles of snow and muddy trails; they did not reach Chaney Glacier. They ran out of time. Rob and Dave will try again to reach their goal.

What are the adventures of Rob and Dave to do with our 2017 Stewardship Drive?

Everything!!!

They were not alone. They relied on their relationship. They had some amazing days. They had some very hard days. They did not quite reach their goal.

And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us.

They are going to persevere, and they are very hopeful to reach Chaney Glacier in the near future.

It was a beautiful year for Holy Spirit—building relationships, building trust and building progress for reaching our goal. More than 35 people from the congregation volunteered for Vacation Bible School. There are eight new members of the choir. Fourteen people went to Myanmar to teach English and bond with the people there. Gretchen has a new program for Church School that invites a number of mentors from the congregation to shepherd children for segments of the year. Compline is now a fully lay-led service with two members stepping up to co-chair this growing ministry. Not to mention QUEST, Butterfly Grants, and caring for our shut-ins and sick.

We are not quite at our goal. Some beautiful days, some difficult days, some days we see the trail clearly. Some days we see only roadblocks. Like Rob and Dave, we do not go alone. We have the Holy Spirit community to help us.

We, together, with God's love and grace, will reach our goal."

Through the deepening of relationships we embody and reveal Christ's healing love and renewal of life. We do this together: in commitment to one another and with God's abiding grace. The journey has begun. Now let us persevere on the road ahead, trusting the good work already begun!
